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Graham McKirdy memorial lecture

Graham McKirdyIn memoriam

"I tend to go and get things done as best as I can. It's a bit like a football team, occasionally you're the captain but you're a part of a team and everybody works to deliver what's best for dentists and patients".

This quote exemplified Graham's approach to clinical practice, teaching and to dental politics. Born in Clydebank, Graham graduated from GDH&S in 1979 and began a career in general dental practice in Glasgow and Lanarkshire. He also spent over twenty years as a visiting GDP teaching dental students.

Early in his career Graham was elected to Lanarkshire Local Dental Committee and thus began an interest – indeed, a passion – for advocacy and representation of patients and communities, dental professionals and other healthcare workers, which continued throughout the rest of his life. He took part in all manner of representative bodies, committees and working groups within the BDA at Scottish and UK level. His learned knowledge of NHS pensions was so detailed he was later appointed to the NHS Scotland Pension Board as a member representative looking after the superannuation interests of all NHS workers.

Graham was a Past President of our West



of Scotland Branch and he was later awarded the highly prestigious Fellowship of the British Dental Association, an honour bestowed only on those who have given "exceptional and distinguished service to the profession". He also received a lifetime achievement award from the Conference of Scottish Local Dental Committees.

Those of us who spent time on committees with Graham fondly recall his many idiosyncrasies: the brightly-coloured neck-ties with comic cartoon motifs, the spectacles always perched on the top of his head, and, invariably, the jacket off and shirt sleeves rolled up – the latter a perfect metaphor for his attitude to life and work!

As a lasting tribute to our dear friend and colleague Branch Council has instigated the annual "Graham McKirdy memorial lecture".

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"After amalgam, the battle of the bulk fills"

- Learn about alternatives to amalgam, where and when each type can be used, eg resin composite bulk fill materials, and self-adhesive bulk fill composites
- Learn about Glass Ionomer Cement (GIC) and its variants.

Learning objectives

- Be aware of why dental amalgam's days are numbered.
- Know the most recent developments in bulk fill resin composite materials, including self-adhesive variants, for loadbearing situations in posterior teeth
- Be aware of the clinical performance of new GIC materials in loadbearing situations in posterior teeth.

This presentation will examine alternative amalgam materials, reviewing the contemporary literature on their clinical performance.

Trevor graduated at Queens University
Belfast, and, following appointments there,
he worked in general dental practice in
Manchester for 21 years, also working
part time in the Dept. of Restorative
Dentistry at the University of Manchester.
He was awarded a Chair in Glasgow in
1996, moving to become Professor of
Primary Dental Care at the University
of Birmingham and Hon. Consultant in
Restorative Dentistry in 2000, becoming
part- time in 2014, before becoming
Emeritus Professor in October 2020. Trevor

is (co-) author of 380 papers published in peer-reviewed journals and has been awarded over 70 research grants. As well as research, writing and medicolegal work, Trevor's main responsibility has been as Editorial Director of the journal *Dental Update*, before taking a more background role in April 2024.

Linda Greenwall MBE

Specialist in Restorative Dentistry and Prosthodontics

Linda is a third-generation dentist born in Cape Town, South Africa. She graduated from Wits Dental School in 1984 before moving to the UK in 1985 to expand her career. Specialising in tooth whitening and minimally invasive dentistry, she has authored four textbooks, with her first translated into five languages. A respected global lecturer since 1989, Linda has presented her research worldwide.

In 2011, she founded the Dental Wellness Trust, a non-profit focused on improving oral health in underprivileged communities, particularly through the LiveSmart supervised tooth brushing programme. This initiative supports over 20,000 children in South African townships and 12,000 in the UK, also offering screenings,

fluoride applications, and outreach dental care in partnership with the University of Western Cape (UWC). Their collaboration has led to multiple research presentations at the IADR and mobile dental outreach efforts.


Awarded the British Empire Medal in 2017 and the John Tomes Award by the British Dental Association in 2023, Linda has been recognised for her significant contributions to dentistry. She also co-founded the Women Dentists Network in 2020 to support female professionals. Linda continues to manage a busy London-based specialist dental practice, while lecturing, writing, and enjoying time with her four sons and grandchildren.

Linda was awarded an MBE in the 2025 King's Birthday Honours List for her services to dentistry and to charity.

- Develop practical strategies for reducing sugar consumption in daily life.


